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Gathering baseline data

Introduction

A well-planned literacy program is based on information that gives you an understanding of the current situation and a realistic prediction of the future situation. This information is the <u>baseline</u> <u>data</u>.

Things to do

Here are the things to do when you gather baseline data:

- Ask questions relating to the following:
 - The general situation of the community
 - The educational situation
 - The economic situation
 - The sociocultural situation
 - The spiritual situation
 - The attitudes of different groups to indigenous languages
 - The community's attitude toward their language
 - The national and regional attitude towards local languages in general
 - The attitude of those in the formal education system to the use of local languages in the classroom
 - Motivation for literacy
 - Motivation among community members
 - Motivation among government, education, and <u>nongovernment organization</u> leaders
 - The <u>dialect</u> situation as it will affect a literacy program
 - The numbers and location of dialects and their mutual intelligibility
 - The dialects which should be selected for beginning the program
 - Leadership and support for the program
 - Community members who can be trained for full-time involvement in the program
 - Community members who will provide support for the program
 - Nongovernment organization and government personnel who will support and facilitate the program
